- £4200 of direct funding or grant donations




# This year's progress

We will continue to work to deliver the 5 year plan hope that the UK will continue to return to normality, so all our sampling programmes will resume or start in 2022. Training will begin in Spring.

Our art is finishing its tour around the libraries to go to Chatham Historic Dockyard for February and March to create a flotilla of litter boats. The children's art will be published in autumn.

We also will be able to return to running workshops to make alternatives to plastic items in the house.

Estuary clean ups will return along with those in Litter Free Maritime landside areas.


heritage of the Intra high street in-between Rochester and Chatham. We created slices of litter (from 2020's Island litter clean ups) set in resin. These were initially installed in the high street, then in Chatham and Rochester libraries and are now touring the rest of Medway Council Libraries.

The team ran events alongside the installation for children to write poems, draw messages about the litter they have seen and the impact it has.



## Thames Manta

We managed to return to the Thames after two years away. Unfortunately we weren't able to pass under the Hammersmith Bridge due to the restrictions at the time. But we did achieve the rest of the samples. These, along with the two sets from the Medway are with Brunel University for analysis.



#### Litter Free Maritime

For another year we were able to do community events, but thanks to a student from University of Greenwich, we were able to complete research on the daily photographs to help MDL plan maintenance. Another local Student, Tommy age 9, gave up some of his summer to design a poster to explain what the litter boom is for to passers-by.

Marina clean ups have now become a firm fixture of our calendar with the MDL team, possible despite the restrictions from the boats and maintaining social distance. We have certainly seen an increase in items and we are collecting a menagerie of toys alongside balls of all sizes,

# Litter Critter Island Clean Ups

Island Clean ups continued this year, with more groups attending. We even brought the litter pack to Chatham Reach festival for the visitors to see what was out there! This year we had support from Peel Ports to dispose of the non recyclable items. We



have been collecting hard plastic and rope as part of a national pilot project.

# Fish of Medway

As planned the new project Fish of the Medway has started. This is in partnership with ROFF (Rochester Oyster and Floating Fishery), Environment Agency, Institute of Fisheries Management, and Hadlow College. These organisations will have oversight of the project to make sure that it doesn't create damage to the estuary.

Research has been completed by another University of Greenwich Student to identify sites in the Not Take Zone and across the estuary to effectively monitor the protection's impact.

Monitoring will start in earnest in 2022, but thanks to funding from Sea-Changers and ROFF we have the equipment required and are starting training for volunteers. If you'd like to join us or to find out more email fish@living-river.org
